The Problem With Kings

"The days are coming," declares the Lord, "when I will raise up for David a righteous Branch..." Jeremiah 23:5a (NIV)

A common metaphor among the prophets was a branch. The metaphor was meant to imply that the nation of Israel, God's chosen people, had become a stump or tree that had been cut down and was in need of a new branch to show new life.

Hope Of A New King

Jeremiah spoke of a king from the line of David who would be righteous, bring justice, and be the fulfillment of God's covenant to Israel.

Jesus Christ is that king.

God's Restorative Kingdom

600 years after Jeremiah spoke this king, Jesus comes as a new kind of king and establishes a new kind of kingdom. In his kingdom, things are made right for those who have suffered wrong.

- -poor restored to prosperity
- -sick restored to health
- -suffering restored to well-being
- -rejected restored to acceptance
- -oppressed restored to liberty
- -sinner restored to forgiveness

Jesus reveals God's heart to restore. The prophetic word is this: In the middle of your mess, God has not forgotten you!

NOTES:

God's Peaceful Kingdom

He will proclaim peace to the nations. -Zechariah 9:10b (NIV)

Jesus rides into Jerusalem on a donkey because, as king, he will get rid of the usual transportation for a king - the war horse. God's true king has no use for a war horse!

He does not establish peace with greater violence. He does not establish peace by giving weapons to the good people instead of the bad people. This king knows that if "peace" is won through violent force it is establishing a new kingdom on the same foundation and nothing has changed.

Rather, His peace comes by letting go of hate and fear and taking hold of the fact that all the hate, violence, and vengeance we are tempted to bring against one another has already been brought upon him. The prophet Isaiah says it this way in Isaiah 53:5, "He was beaten that we may have peace."

Prayer

God of hope, you call us home from the exile of selfish oppression to the freedom of justice, the balm of healing, and the joy of sharing.

Make us strong to join you in your holy work, as friends of strangers and victims, companions of those whom others shun, and as the happiness of those whose hearts are broken. We make our prayer through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
